Wherein the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad by means of a magnificent and spectacular Pageant and Exhibition is commemorating its one hundredth birthday.

N 1827, just one hundred years ago, the first American railroad was born—in Baltimore.

The first step in that system of transport that has made possible the great commercial growth of the United States—that has welded its far-flung communities into a union—the greatest, richest, most prosperous country in the world.

Therefore, as the birthplace of American transportation, it is fitting that Baltimore should be the scene of this splendid pageant which so dramatically portrays the progress of these ten decades.

On a thousand-acre tract, a loop track 6,000 feet long has been laid and upon this the colorful pageant will move before a grandstand seating 12,000 people. The ex-

hibits are housed in a brick-and-steel Hall of Transportation, 502 feet long. Many other necessary auxiliary buildings provided. More than a thousand people are employed in the production.

When The Capitol Limited has finished its circuit of the loop track, it will return in front of the grandstand, where its passengers will alight and take the motor buses at the trainside in the fashion employed by the Baltimore and Ohio at its Jersey City Terminal.
